- If you or someone you know has been directly impacted by a hate crime or racist incident, please report the incident and your story to <u>STOP AAPI HATE</u> (English). Also available in <u>Chinese, Korean, Thai, Vietnamese, Japanese</u> or <u>Khmer</u>.

2. Health Access & Guidance Regarding Covid-19

- USCIS has confirmed that the Public Charge rule does not restrict access to testing, screening, or treatment of communicable diseases, including COVID-19. USCIS Alert
- Some undocumented individuals are eligible for full-scope Medi-Cal. Currently, Medi-Cal covers <u>testing</u> at no cost.
 - i. <u>Senate Bill 75</u> offers full-scope Medi-Cal to undocumented children up to 19 years of age.
 - ii. New legislation has expanded full-scope Medi-Cal benefits to <u>young undocumented</u> adults under age 26.
 - iii. <u>Individuals with DACA status</u> will continue to be eligible for state-funded, full scope Medi
 - iv. Undocumented people are also qualified for Emergency Medi-Cal
- o Protecting Immigrant Families explains your rights when accessing health services.
- United We Dream published a <u>list of state-specific health care resources</u> for undocumented folks and a great video about how to make your own hand sanitizer.



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- Free Clinic Directory has nationwide resources for uninsured people to <u>connect with affordable</u> and free health clinics in their area.
- One Degree connects low-income families to <u>health resources</u> in the San Francisco Bay Area and Los Angeles County.
- Department of Public Health has FAQs in <u>English</u>, <u>Spanish</u>, <u>Traditional</u> Chinese, <u>Simplified</u>
 Chinese, <u>Vietnamese</u>, <u>Tagalog</u>, and <u>Japanese</u>: wash hands, social distancing, extra caution for elderly/pregnant/those with underlying conditions. (Other languages also available)
- There are currently **no home test kits** for COVID-19. Avoid any <u>suspected scams</u>.

3. Connecting To Free/Low-Cost Resources

- U-Haul is offering <u>free storage units for 30 days</u> to college students.
- Several video conferencing software companies have opened up free access to their premium features including <u>Cisco Webex</u>, <u>Google Hangouts (for schools and businesses)</u>, and <u>Zoom</u> (for K-12 schools)
- Carriers like Charter, Comcast, and AT&T are offering free or reduced-cost internet access for students and low-income families. <u>Learn more</u>
- o California utilities <u>suspend customer shut-offs</u> due to non-payment
- Car rental agencies (<u>Avis</u> & <u>Enterprise</u>) will waive underage fees for college students, under 25, who are returning home.
- Check out this national guide created by the Hope Center on <u>Supporting Students during</u> COVID-19
- If you have family members who are citizens, you may be eligible for CalFresh benefits. Learn more here in <u>English</u> or <u>Spanish</u>.

4. Relief Funds

- On April 15th, Governor Newsom announced California's \$75 million <u>Disaster Relief Fund to</u> <u>support undocumented Californians impacted by COVID-19</u> who are ineligible for unemployment insurance benefits and other disaster relief (including the CARES Act) due to their immigration status. - Relief Funds For Undocumented Workers In California and beyond (available in English, Spanish & Chinese)
- UndocuScholars created an <u>extensive list of nationwide resources</u> for undocumented Communities facing COVID-19
- US-based BIPOC artists can apply to the Arts & Culture Leaders of Color Emergency Fund
- Access this fund for in-home care workers, nannies, and house cleaners from the <u>National</u> <u>Domestic Workers Alliance</u>.
- Inclusive Action for the City has created the <u>Street Vendor Emergency Fund</u> for Los Angeles vendors who cannot access assistance from the government.
- Los Angeles is offering the <u>Angeleno Card</u>, which provides financial assistance via no-fee prepaid cards, for households in need affected by the Coronavirus



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- United We Dream is offering \$400 to undocumented individuals and their families through their <u>National UndocuFund</u>. Applicants must not be eligible to receive state and/or federal aid and be able to show proof of hardship caused by COVID-19. Applications open April 24th.
- NAKASEC has an Emergency Mutual Aid Fund for individuals affected by COVID-19 and do not qualify for government aid due to immigration status. Apply here.
- Massachusetts Jobs with Justice has put together a list of <u>Workers Emergency Relief Funds</u>, which are available to individuals regardless of their immigration status.
- Scholarship Junkies' <u>Covid-19 Relief Fund</u> is offering \$500 to \$1,000 to undocumented folks in the state of Washington.

5. Legal Rights and Supports for Workers

General

NATIONWIDE

- To find out about unemployment benefits in your state, use the U.S. Dept. of Labor's <u>Unemployment Benefits Finder</u> to determine eligibility and how to apply.
- A <u>2020 Recovery Rebate Tax Credit</u> will be available to all adults who have a valid Social Security number, are authorized to work, and are not claimed as a dependent on another person's tax return. Maximum amount is \$1200 per qualifying adult and \$500 per "qualifying child".
- Protecting Immigrant Families created a table with a general overview of some of the federal public programs available to support individuals and families during the COVID-19 crisis including their eligibility requirements and implications for public charge criteria. Testing, prevention and medical treatment, as well as stimulus checks and unemployment insurance are NOT considered in public charge. <u>Learn more here</u>.



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CALIFORNIA

- The California Employment Development Department (EDD) is encouraging individuals with DACA and other employment authorizations who are affected by coronavirus layoffs to apply for unemployment benefits. Workers don't have to be sick to qualify. Individuals who were laid off or had hours reduced due to coronavirus restrictions can also apply.

- The California Department of Social Services (CDSS) has received additional funding to support individuals with their DACA renewal fees for income-eligible CA residents. You can find a list of eligible legal service providers here.

6. Supporting Businesses & Freelancers

General

- Check out this list of <u>online contracting opportunities in high demand</u> during the COVID-19
 crisis. While undocumented people without work authorization are not eligible for
 unemployment benefits, now's a good time to think about alternatives ways to generate income
 through freelancing and entrepreneurship.
- Check out this guide to <u>supporting artists</u>, <u>performers</u>, <u>and service industry folks</u> during Coronavirus

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Accessing Financial Capital

- o Immigrants Rising's KickStarter Grants offers short-term, non-renewable grants.
- Low-interest business loans ranging from \$2,600 to \$250,000 are available through Opportunity Fund.
- Mission Asset Fund offers 0% interest for credit-building loans (up to \$2,400) and loans to start or expand a business (up to \$2,500) Immigrants nationally. They also provide loans to CA residents to pay for USCIS application fees.
- Find loans or local business assistance on Venturize.
- <u>COVID19 Capital Relief Directory</u> is a searchable database that includes grants, loans, and other cash equivalents that can help entrepreneurs, nonprofits and businesses anywhere in the world cope with the crisis.
- To support immediate needs, the Kauffman Foundation published <u>a guide to Small Business</u>
 <u>Administration (SBA) lending</u> and they are promoting the <u>COVID-19 Business Resources</u>
 <u>Center</u>, developed by Hello Alice, which is updated daily with funding opportunities, resources, and information for small business owners.
- The SBA is providing Economic Injury Disaster Loans (EIDLs) for small businesses suffering
 economic injury as a result of the COVID-19 crisis. EIDLs are low interest loans to pay for
 expenses incurred as a result of the crisis. To apply, visit covid19relief.sba.gov.
- The new Payroll Protection Program (PPP), administered by the SBA and the U.S. Treasury, was created to help small businesses impacted by COVID-19 maintain payroll and cover costs associated with rent, utilities, and other overhead payments. These loans can be forgiven if borrowers primarily use them to maintain their payroll.
 - i. First check with your local bank to see if they are participating in PPP.
 - ii. If you don't have a local banking relationship, check SBA's website to <u>find an approved lender</u>.
 - iii. The law expands the number of institutions that can provide PPP loans. If you are unsure if a lender is authorized, check the SBA site or <u>contact your local district office</u>.

7. Housing

- Various cities in California and other states have issued rent moratoriums for a limited time to
 prevent residents from being evicted due to a loss of income related to a business closure, loss
 of hours or wages, layoffs, or out-of-pocket medical costs caused by the COVID-19 pandemic.
 - i. California: Statewide, Los Angeles, Oakland, San Francisco, San Jose
 - ii. Other States: Indiana, Kansas, Michigan, New Jersey, New York
 - iii. To determine whether your city or state has a rent moratorium, please check your city government website or this <u>national listing</u> for updates.



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 Use letters from SideHustle Templates for <u>CA Renters</u> or <u>Renters Outside CA</u> to reach out to your landlord to request a rent payment plan, rent suspension and/or temporary rent reduction due to COVID-19

8. K-12 Resources

- Several K-12 school districts across California are offering free meals to students and their families including <u>Butte</u>, <u>Coachella Valley</u>, <u>Jefferson en Español</u>, <u>Fresno</u>, <u>Los Angeles County</u>, <u>Marin</u>, <u>Merced</u>, <u>Monterey County</u>, <u>Oakland</u>, <u>Riverside</u>, <u>San Francisco</u>, <u>San Mateo & Santa</u> Clara, Shasta, Stockton, and Yuba City.
- Free computers are available for low income students through <u>The On It Foundation</u> and Computers with Causes
- Students from Harvard, MIT, UC Berkeley give <u>free tutoring</u> to K-12 students. Visit https://gopeer.org/ to learn more.
- <u>Cultivating Hope</u> offers FREE online math classes taught by graduates of UCLA, Harvard, and Dartmouth University.

9. Organizing & Action-Oriented

- United We Dream is asking folks to <u>sign their petition to ensure care for all immigrants &</u> suspend enforcement activities
- Define American is <u>compiling stories</u> of folks coming together to bolster community health and safety across America's diverse cultural landscape.
- Medical professionals have written an <u>Open Letter to ICE</u> urging the release of individuals in immigration detention given the risk of COVID-19.
- Detention Watch Network created an <u>organizational sign on letter to ICE</u> calling for the release of all people and cessation of enforcement operations

11. Federal Government Updates

- CLINIC is working with government agencies and partners to secure the <u>most up-to-date</u> information regarding agency status and responses to the COVID-19 crisis
- United States Citizenship and Immigration Services (USCIS) will accept all benefit forms and documents with reproduced original signatures, including the Form I-129, Petition for Nonimmigrant Worker, for submissions dated March 21, 2020, and after. <u>Learn More</u>
- USCIS is suspending in-person services at its field offices, asylum offices, and application support centers from March 18 until June 4th. <u>However, USCIS staff will continue to perform</u> <u>duties that do not involve contact with the public</u>. In the meantime, please call the USCIS <u>Contact Center for assistance with emergency immigration-related services</u>.
- USCIS announced that it will <u>reuse previously submitted biometrics</u> in order to process valid
 Form I-765, Application for Employment Authorizations extension requests until offices reopen.
- Effective March 18, Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) will seek to arrest only
 persons whom they believe are "public safety risks" and certain individuals with criminal
 backgrounds. For all others, ICE will exercise discretion to delay arrests until after the public
 health crisis diminishes or utilize alternatives. Review the change in policy about Immigration
 Enforcement and other ICE COVID-19 updates.
- The IRS deadline for filing federal taxes has been extended until July 15, 2020. For more information <u>check here</u>. Individual state filing deadlines may vary.
- The Census Bureau has extended the <u>deadline to complete the 2020 census</u> to August 14, 2020.
- U.S. Department of Education has announced that <u>students can bypass standardized testing</u> this school year.
